Adult Day Health Services

Wise Adult Day Health is a day support service for adults experiencing health care related issues or whose ability to function independently is limited. Wise is designed to provide quality services, including daily leisure, recreational and preventive health activities to aging or disabled individuals. An R.N. oversees all health-related activities, including restorative and maintenance therapies, nutritional consulting, and participant/caregiver training in preventive health. A nutritious lunch is served daily along with two snacks. In accordance with Federal law and U.S. Department of Agriculture policy, AHS will not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, age or disability. 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EHS Update by Georgie Ouellette

Early Head Start Child Care Partnerships: AHS and Child Care partners from Fall River, New Bedford, and Brockton met in May to establish roles and responsibilities for providing comprehensive Early Head Start services in their child care centers. Contract was also finalized in May by our attorney and reviews from the Regional Office for Head Start program specialists. Contracts will be presented in June to Child Care Board of Directors to establish partnerships with AHS. Once contracts are signed, efforts will begin to provide upgrades and supports to bring centers up to compliance with Federal Early Head Start regulations and prepare the enrollment process for eligible families. Enrollment is projected to begin in August.

New Hires: Interviews were held for a new LSW position and PCA open position. Congratulations to Kim Correia our new Early Head Start LSW. Kim will begin her new role in mid-June providing family review and oversight to our home-based program as well as behavior management supports to our center based partnerships. This position is a great addition to how Early Head Start services support families and staff. Congratulations also goes to Kirstyn Cote on accepting a position as PCA, pending policy council approval, for our home-based program. Kirstyn will be providing home-based services to the Middleboro and Attleboro families.

Our **delegate home-based program** for Taunton and Raynham families continue their transition planning to its grantee agency Triumph Inc. Families have participated in discussions with their PCA regarding their role in easing transition anxiety for both children and themselves, and goal planning surrounding their child's needs for child care and socializations. Triumph staff have participated in family reviews with AHS staff to become familiar with children and families' needs and strengths. Families will have their first visit to tour the Riverway facility on June 4th. Families have also received (continued on next column)

communication from Triumph regarding upcoming activities available to them. The final date for transition to Triumph is June 15th, with a farewell activity planned at AHS on June 11th during the regularly scheduled socialization group.

Professional Development: Staff participated in the "26th Annual Partners in Perinatal Health Conference" on May 12, 2015. Partners in Perinatal Health is a state-wide partnership of non-profit organizations committed to improving the quality of health care available to childbearing families. Staff who participated were given opportunities to examine current health issues that impact infant survival and women's health, identify cultural issues affecting perinatal health care, share knowledge and exchange information among health professionals about perinatal health, and to examine model programs addressing the many conditions that put mothers and children at risk. These topics are helpful in providing quality services to our families at AHS.

Early Head Start Program is a federally funded program that provides comprehensive services to families who are pregnant or have children between the ages of birth to 3 and meet income guidelines. Please call 508-880-0202, ext. 355 for more information or to make a referral.

Early Intervention Program is an integrated developmental service available to families of children, between birth and three years of age, for whom there are developmental concerns due to identified disabilities, certain birth circumstances, or environmental circumstances (e.g. cerebral palsy, prematurity, homelessness) or show a delay in one or more areas of development. EHS Outcomes

Parent, Family & Community Engagement Outcomes

Early Head Start staff researched and adapted a tool for collecting data that captures each family's status across 19 indicators in all of the 7 PFCE (Parent, Family & Community Engagement) outcome measurement areas. Once this was finalized, the Cleverex staff worked with us to develop a customized means of aggregating this data, and analyzing it at three checkpoints throughout the year. We have completed our baseline collection of data, and will record our second set at the June checkpoint. This system will enable us to analyze data and design program goals and activities based on the growth and stability of our families in the following areas of Parent, Family & Community Engagement:

- * Family Well-Being
- * Parent-Child Relationships
- * Families as Lifelong Educators
- * Families as Lifelong Learners
- * Family Engagement in Transitions
- * Family Connectedness to Peers and Community
- * Families as Advocates and Leaders

School Readiness Outcomes


Early Head Start has implemented the use of the Brigance Assessment tool to measure child outcomes in relation to school readiness. The Brigance Assessment captures child progress across all five areas of School Readiness, including Language, Motor, Cognition, Social-Emotional, and Approaches to Learning. Parent Child Advocates completed the Brigance Assessment along with families over the first checkpoint period. This information was then entered into the PROMIS Database system to aggregate the data and measure progress, not only individually but programmatically. The second checkpoint will be completed in September, and the results will be compared and analyzed to show growth and areas that may need development. At the next checkpoint Early Head Start will be looking for increased progress in the area of Language and Literacy.
